Middle TN Grain Conference

• We recently completed the Middle TN Grain Conference, a combined effort of the 12 counties in our immediate area. The conference featured the largest trade show of its kind east of the Mississippi River with 250 attendees. The conference was held with the support of the University of Tennessee Space Institute in Tullahoma and UT Extension in surrounding counties. Featured educational sessions focused on commodity trade, weed control, and weather. The keynote speaker was Mr. Alex Harrell the current world record holder for soybean yield at 218 bushels an acre.

Master Gardeners

 Once again, we have a capacity crowd at the Master Gardener Intern Training class. The class is composed of 34 interns taking the class. The class is composed of eight educational sessions covering everything from fruit and vegetable production to lawn care and disease control. We are extremely proud of this as we are one of the larger intern classes--one of only two still meeting in-person Tuesday evenings. Warren County has the only master gardener program of note in the area. Clients wanting to participate in the program would have to travel to Rutherford or Putnam Counties for the closest organization.

Master Farm Manager

 Our Master Farm Manager class recently concluded. There were 47 producers from Warren and DeKalb counties participating in the class implemented by the UT Center for Farm Management and UT TSU Extension of Warren and DeKalb Counties. This course focused on estate planning, taxes, financial documents, etc. Graduates of the program are eligible for cost share savings with the Tennessee Ag Enhancement Programs.

Other Tidbits

 Other than the traditional meetings, we have been busy assisting producers get their reimbursements from the TN Ag Enhancement Program, preparing educational materials for the upcoming restricted use pesticide recertification period beginning this fall.

Staff Updates

 I am proud to report the FCS position has been announced and interviews will commence soon. We are still waiting on the TSU funded 4-H position announcement. I understand it has been approved and is currently in the process of being posted.

 Meeting was held in February with updates given by program assistant on programming efforts. Upcoming plans were announced and members gave agency updates.

Eat Smart, Move More

- The Haven (part of H.O.M.E) Nine enrolled and tasted Easy Fruit Salad and Beefy Skillet meals from the Eat Smart, Move More curriculum. Recipes were well received. Classes continue through early March.
- Day Reporting Center Classes started in late October and continued through December 2024. Nine participants completed the ten-lesson class.

Commodities

- In December 358 food boxes were distributed. TNCEP handed out *Celebrations and Gatherings/Grocery Shopping* flyers
- February numbers were down with 289 food boxes distributed and flyers on Smart Shopping for Veggies and Fruits /Liven up Your Meals with Fruits and Vegetables

Making Tracks with Rudy Raccoon

 Curriculum was taught during December, January and February at seven school locations. Children learned about dairy, fruits and vegetables as well as being exposed to tastings of fresh blueberries. Most classrooms liked the blueberries. It was a new taste for some and for others they had previously tasted the fruit.

Learn, Grow, Eat and Go

 The after-school group at Dibrell Elementary learned about warm and cool season gardens, layout of a garden, and planting of seeds verses transplants. They observed preparing

of Garden Skillet Sizzle that included zucchini, yellow squash, red, green and



yellow bell peppers, grape tomatoes, all mixed with reduced fat Italian dressing and parmesan cheese. Each student tasted the recipe with half liking and asking for more and those who did not care for the taste. Everyone at least gave it a try!

4-H School Clubs

- December hosts our county-wide public speaking contest which included the top speakers from 4-12th grade. Over 650 students presented a speech in the classroom and the first-place speakers advanced to the county contest. First and second place speakers move to the sub regional contest.
- This school year, Leah and I brought back the 4-H Clover Bowl. This is a regional and state contest we scaled down to host in the 4-6th grade classrooms. The contest highlighted Tennessee history, agriculture, science and additional life skills. Over 1,000 4-Hers participated. Throughout February we will judge classroom demonstrations and interactive exhibits with those winners to be invited to the sub regional event in May.

National 4-H FCS Championship & Conference

• Warren County 4-H brought home first place in the Tennessee FCS Skillathon contest and earned a trip to a national level contest held in San Antonio, TX in January. This team memorized nearly 300 different household items such as tools, appliances, cooking ingredients, and housing finishes. Their hard work paid off with the team winning first place in the nation in the life skills division and fifth place overall team. This was Warren County's first national contest invitation in nearly 12 years.



Judging Teams

- Livestock Judging -25 4-Hers are preparing to compete in the Central Region Livestock Judging Contest this April. During weekly practices, team members are learning how to judge commercial and market beef cattle, sheep, goats, and swine. Sr high members are also learning how to write and present oral reasons.
 Practices began mid-January and will run through the beginning of April.
- FCS Skillathon 4-Her's from 6-12th grades will compete at the Central Region FCS Skillathon Contest in April.

This event teaches youth how to use, identify, and define various items found within the home. 4-Hers are also tasked with learning how to complete different life skills such as; event planning, resume building, interview etiquette, and financial literacy.

Warren County 4-H Hot Shots

 This team is in its eighth year. The team is made up of 13 6-12th graders. Team members learn firearm safety and improve their marksmanship skills through shooting trap and skeet. The team practices every Saturday at the Highland Rim Shooters Club in Tullahoma, TN in preparation for the state Shotgun Jamboree on May 3rd. The team is coached by James Jones, Chris Helton, Dustin Stoetzel, and Justin Rich.

2025 Central Region & State Swine Expo

 The 2025 Central Region and State Swine Expo was held January 11-14th at the Hyder-Burke Pavilion in Cookeville, TN. Karsyn Bain (5th grade) and Ayrin Drake (6th grade) represented our county at this event.

County Public Speaking Contest

 The Junior High/Senior High County Public Speaking Contest was held Monday, December 16, and the 4-6th Grade Public Speaking Contest was held Tuesday, December 10. Between the 2 contests, there were 55 participants representing youth in grades 4-12.

Sub-Regional Public Speaking Contest

 All county public speaking first and second place winners advanced to the sub-regional public speaking contest which was held January 23rd at the Motlow State Community College Moore County Campus. Warren County 4-H'ers competed against 4-H members from nine other surrounding counties. Sawyer Moore (5th grade) won his division. Senior high 4-Hers; Tage Moore, Takota Moore, EmiLee Lassiter, and Kaytlen Nunley advanced to the central region public speaking contest February 1.
